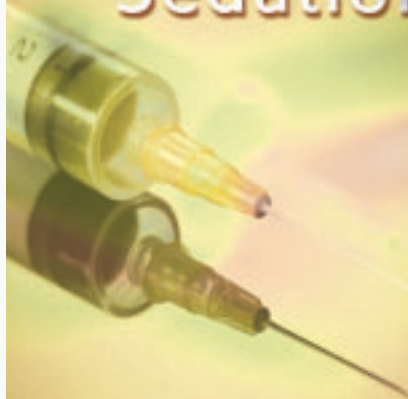

LECTURE COURSE

7 Hours of Continuing Education

SYNOPSIS

Adequate preoperative evaluation of the patient is essential to the safe completion of dental treatment. In this program, an easy-to-use system of physical evaluation will be presented, which enables the doctor to determine the potential risk involved in dental treatment of the medically compromised patient.

The medical history questionnaire, dialogue history and physical evaluation will be discussed as means of spotting the potential patient at risk. Specific diseases will be reviewed, stressing their significance to dentistry. These will include: cardiovascular, respiratory, neurologic and endocrine disorders.

The USC Physical Evaluation System will be introduced as method of categorizing the medically compromised patient and determining the need for therapy modifications. Stress reduction protocols and practical steps which significantly reduce patient risk during treatment, will be reviewed.

SYNOPSIS

This course is designed to provide all members of the dental office team with a concise, up-to-date and practical review of emergency medicine. The course will review the preparation of the dental office for medical emergencies and the prevention, recognition and management of specific situations that can, and do, arise in dental offices and at home. It is recommended that all members of your dental team participate in this program. In addition, give serious consideration to enrolling your office staff in the basic life support provider level course (CPR).

LECTURE, DEMONSTRATION AND PARTICIPATION

7 Hours of Continuing Education

SYNOPSIS

The prevention and management of medical emergencies are vitally important components of an in-office program of preparedness for such life-threatening situations. This clinical program for the doctor, hygienist and assistant, provides didactic demonstration and hands-on experience in the monitoring of patients before and during dental office procedures for the management of life-threatening situations.

The monitoring portion of the course will provide experience in the recording of blood pressure, the heart rate and rhythm (via palpation and electronic pulse meter) and monitoring of heart/lung sounds via stethoscope. The use of the ECG will also be demonstrated. For those who are interested, ear impressions for a personalized precordial/pretracheal stethoscope will be taken. The proper use of emergency equipment will be the subject of the second portion of the course. Demonstrations and practice will be provided in the use of the positive pressure/demand valve (Robert-Shaw, Elder Valve), the self-inflating bag-valve-mask (Ambu bag), the oropharyngeal and nasopharyngeal airway as well as laryngoscope and endotracheal tubes.

LECTURE, DEMONSTRATION AND PARTICIPATION

49 Hours of Continuing Education • Limited Enrollment

SYNOPSIS

Seven days (49 hours) of concentrated study in the basics of intravenous sedation for the doctor not previously trained in this technique. The aim of this course is to enable doctors completing it to return to their practices and feel confident in using intravenous sedation on their patients. This course fulfills the dental board requirements for parenteral sedation permits. This is a clinical course requiring the doctor to treat dental patients who are receiving intravenous medications. This course devotes considerable time to the technique of venipuncture and the intravenous benzodiazepines midazolam and diazepam. To make the course truly valuable for your office staff, it is recommended that they be urged to attend along with the doctor. To be accepted in this course, the doctor must have a currently valid basic life support provider level (or higher) card from either the American Heart Association or the American Red Cross plus the above 3 prerequisite courses.

Fees for the prerequisite courses "Physical Evaluation", "Emergency Medicine" and "Monitoring and Clinical Emergency Medicine" are already included in the fee for this course. CPR is required and not included.

Additional faculty will be included as needed to enhance faculty to participant ratio.
