SYNOPSIS

This program is a supervised practical experience to assist the modern dentist to comfortably use hypnosis in his/her dental practice. Introductory lectures will be followed by demonstrations and videos of the subjects discussed. Each participant will have the opportunity to practice newly learned skills under supervision.

- Phenomena of hypnosis

- Ethics and legal issues
- Resistance to hypnosis

- Waking hypnosis
- Post-hypnotic suggestion

- Time distortion

Upon completion of this course you will be able to:

Dental applications of hypnosis include: relaxation, relief of fears and anxieties, reducing the perception and severity of pain during procedures, post-operatively control of bleeding and salivation (increasing and decreasing), maintenance of position for lengthy procedures (catalepsy), heightening patient motivation, control of gagging, adjusting to new prostheses, control of bruxism and, habits and promotion of oral hygiene.
