Richard D. Udin, DDS

Dr. Richard Udin is the Program Director of Advanced Pediatric Dentistry at USC. Dr. Thomas Tanbonliong serves as the Graduate Clinic Director of the USC Pediatric Dentistry. Dr. Tanbonliong received his pediatric dentistry training at Case Western Reserve University following completion of a General Practice Residency Program at MetroHealth Medical Center in Cleveland, Ohio. He joined the faculty at Case Western Reserve in the Department of Pediatric Dentistry and also the Attending Staff at Rainbow Babies Children's Hospital, prior to coming to USC.

SYNOPSIS

This course is intended for the clinician who treats children in the private practice environment. This one-day presentation will review several topics related to the special needs of the child patient. It is important for all dental professionals to recognize that dental caries is an infectious and transmissible disease that is transmitted at an early age to very young children. Prevention, risk assessment and anticipatory guidance are all components of addressing the needs of this population. In addition, the course will review behavior management techniques and pulp therapy for the young child.

TOPICS TO BE COVERED:

1. New paradigms in understanding the caries process in young children

- The epidemiology and science behind the diagnosis of early childhood caries (ECC)
- Designing an effective preventive program for very young children
- Providing anticipatory guidance for parents
- Determining caries risk assessment in the pediatric population
- Managing the very young patient in your practice

2. Behavior management for the child patient

- Different management techniques to facilitate treatment for anxious, fearful and defiant children
- Clinical application of behavior management techniques
- Working with parents in the dental environment
- Informed consent issues in dentistry for children

3. Traumatic injuries in children

- Assessment of the child patient following a traumatic perioral injury
- Diagnosis and treatment of perioral hard and soft tissue injuries in children
- Management of dental injuries in the primary and permanent dentitions
